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

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








"The International Forest Regime"







3. The current status of forests under international law

The international forest regime:

- is limited in scope and mandate;
- is fragmented;
- is an ad-hoc system of duplication of efforts;
- the precursor for the lack domestic forest legislation.





4. Options for international forest regulation

Forests under the climate regime:

- sinks and sources for carbon dioxide
- subject to discussions within LULUCF and REDD
- subject to accounting difficulties with regard to:
 - + definitions (forest, afforestation, reforestation, deforestation);
 - + measurement (reliable forest information and reporting);
 - + permanence (emission reductions measures need to be permanent);
 - + leakage (displacement of emissions);
 - + state sovereignty and rights to land.









4. Options for international forest regulation

REDD advantages	REDD disadvantages
treaty and negotiation infrastructure	fragmentation of international law
biodiversity safeguards	sectoral approach (tropical forests)
financial incentive	accounting difficulties
political window of opportunity	biodiversity trade-offs

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
